

Final resolution after Congress Session II on March 13, 2014 - APPROVED

Resolution 7 – Recreational Marijuana Use

- WHEREAS, an increase of state approval for use of marijuana for medical purposes is occurring, with the recent legislation for approval for its recreational use in Colorado, and
- WHEREAS, the country remains divided regarding the advisability of recreational marijuana use, with a recent Washington Post poll showing 49% for and 48% against, and
- WHEREAS, debate continues over health effects of its use, especially in the adolescent population whose developing brain is susceptible to the effects of marijuana use, showing a potential 6-8% reduction in IQ, and
- WHEREAS, the addiction rate of marijuana use is 9%, with the increase in THC content making for a more potent product, and
- WHEREAS, future marketing of promoting marijuana use, as was the case with tobacco, will lead into more use and abuse by minors, and
- WHEREAS, no immediate testing exists to determine acute marijuana intoxication, as exists with alcohol, potentially causing more motor vehicle accidents due to driver impairment; now, therefore be it
- RESOLVED, that the American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) opposes the recreational use and promotional marketing of marijuana; and, be it further
- RESOLVED, that the ACOFP supports increased education to both adolescent and adult populations on the harmful effects of marijuana use.

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
