## **RESOLUTION NO. 11**

1 2 3 4	WHEREAS, board certification was always intended to be a one-time accomplishment based upon completion of intensive training, clinical experience and study, followed by an examination, and
5 6 7	WHEREAS, board certification was always intended to be a lifetime achievement, just the same as a diploma from a university or college of osteopathic medicine, and
8 9 10	WHEREAS, over the past 20 years, recertification has insidiously become a requirement for physicians, and
11 12 13	WHEREAS, recertification has never been scientifically proven to be a measure of a physician's competency, qualification, or standard of practice, and
14 15	WHEREAS, recertification is burdensome, time consuming, and expensive, and
16 17 18 19	WHEREAS, osteopathic physicians have been advised that American Osteopathic Association (AOA) certification would no longer be viable if they failed to pay dues or maintain membership in various osteopathic organizations, and
20 21 22 23 24	WHEREAS, health maintenance organizations, hospitals, institutions, employer, insurance companies, and state medical boards have begun to use recertification as a measure of credentialing and as a means of interfering with a physician's right to continue to practice good medical care for patients, and
25 26 27 28	WHEREAS, recertification requirements have resulted in serious disruptions of physicians, thus taking away valuable time from the care of patients and the physicians personal lives, and
29 30 31 32 33	WHEREAS, no other professionals who serve the public, such as school teachers, lawyers, police officers, dentists, pharmacists, engineers, legislators, judges, accountants, HMO executives, firefighters, and US presidents are subject to similar onerous and overreaching requirements to practice their profession, and
34 35 36 37	WHEREAS, the American Osteopathic Association (AOA) is a non-profit, dues-paying organization that was created to represent its physician members, not to add to the burden of their professional practice; now, therefore be it

38	RESOLVED, that the American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) request
39	the American Osteopathic Association (AOA) to immediately consider all board
40	certifications to be permanent and lifetime, and be it further
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42	RESOLVED, that the ACOFP requests the AOA to discontinue its current recertification
43	process in all areas of specialization, and be it further
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45	RESOLVED, that the ACOFP requests the AOA to commence a legislative initiative in all 50
46	states to prevent health maintenance organizations, state boards of medical
47	examiners, insurance companies, hospitals, institutions, colleges of osteopathic
48	medicine and allopathic medical schools, clinical practices, and all other physician
49	employers from requiring recertification as a method of physician credentialing,
50	and be it further
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52	RESOLVED, that the ACOFP requests that the AOA to do its best to work together with the
53	American Medical Association (AMA), to further this initiative; and be it further
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55	RESOLVED, that the ACOFP submits this resolution to the 2016 AOA House of Delegates,
56	with a report presented to the 2017 ACOFP Congress of Delegates.
