## RESOLUTION NO. 9

1 2 3 4	WHEREAS, while the current method of requiring family medicine board certification requires an exam every eight years with maintenance of certification has some benefit for some physicians to assure competency, there is dissatisfaction for many physicians due to the maintenance of certification modules, expense, time required away from practice, and
5	condensed study requirements; and
6	WHEREAS, development of a new additional pathway for continuous maintenance of board
7	certification could provide physicians continuous lifetime board certification provided
8 9	these physicians enroll and are compliant in the continuous life-long board certification teaching modules; and
10	WHEREAS, a new method of continuous life-long board certification would allow the American
11	Osteopathic Board of Family Physicians (AOBFP) a method to identify specific subsections
12	of medicine and surgery based on scope of practice that could be continually reinforced and
13	tested in a method that provides for optimum patient outcomes; and
14	WHEREAS, offering of a continuous life-long certification CME process could attract new residency
15	graduates of the ACGME Single Accreditation System to AOBFP, especially since the ACGME
16	is proposing to eliminate the requirement to take American Osteopathic Association (AOA)
17	board certification for 80% of graduates from Osteopathic Recognized residency programs;

19	WHEREAS, current experience with osteopathic residency graduates from dually accredited
20	programs result in a majority of the DO residents opting for the American Board of Medical
21	Specialists (ABMS) examination which will likely continue under a Single Accreditation
22	System and result in the loss of AOA membership, and
23	WHEREAS, this flexibility would allow AOA to offer CME, maintenance of licensure, and board
24	certification for all physicians in Osteopathic CME recognized programs by including them
25	in this new osteopathic board certification method; now, therefore be it
26	RESOLVED, that the American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) requests that the
27	American Osteopathic Association (AOA) and the American Osteopathic Board of Family
28	Physicians (AOBFP) study, develop, and promote a continuous life-long board certification
29	pathway for residents and physicians who choose AOA/AOBFP board certification utilizing
30	continuous learning.
