 Opposition of Physician Gag Rules

RESOLUTION NO. 10

WHEREAS, legislation that limits the capacity of physicians to ask questions of their patients about gun ownership and to counsel patients about the dangers of guns in the home (herein referred to as "physician gag rules") interferes with the preventive care duties of health care practitioners and violates the First Amendment rights of physicians and their patients; and

WHEREAS, physicians and other health care practitioners play a key role in counseling patients about the risks of injuries and best practices to minimize those risks as part of the practice of preventive care; and

WHEREAS, the American Medical Association adopted a policy to reduce pediatric firearm morbidity and mortality by encouraging its members to: (a) inquire as to the presence of household firearms as part of childproofing the home; (b) educate patients to the dangers of firearms to children; (c) encourage patients to educate their children and neighbors as to the dangers of firearms; and (d) routinely remind patients to obtain firearm safety locks, to store firearms under lock and key, and to store ammunition separately from firearms. Safety counseling regarding firearms in the home is also a recommended part of adult medical care. The American Psychiatric Association has recommended that "health professionals and health systems should ask about firearm ownership whenever clinically appropriate in the judgment of the physician." And,

WHEREAS, physician gag rules limit physician capacity to appropriately counsel their patients and parents; and

WHEREAS, the provision of safety counseling by physicians, who are private, not governmental actors, to patients who are entirely free to ignore the physicians' advice, raises no serious Second Amendment issue; now, therefore be it,

RESOLVED, that the American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) oppose governmental actions and policies that limit the capacity of physicians and other health care providers to inquire of their patients on whether they possess guns, how they are secured in the home, to counsel their patients about the dangers of guns in the home, and safe practices to avoid those dangers; and, be it further,

RESOLVED, that the ACOFP oppose any further legislation or initiatives advocating physician gag rules that limit physicians' right to free speech.
