RESOLUTION NO. 31

1 2	WHEREAS, the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) was established in law under Section 222 of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. § 217a) ¹ , and
3 4 5	WHEREAS, the ACIP is comprised of medical and public health experts who develop recommendations on the use of vaccines in the civilian population of the United States ¹ , and
6 7	WHEREAS, the recommendations of the ACIP stand as public health guidance for the safe use of vaccines and related biological products ¹ , and
8 9 10 11	WHEREAS, the ACIP works with 30 professional organizations that are highly regarded in the health field in the development of its recommendations ¹ , and
12 13 14 15	WHEREAS, between 1950 and 2013, deaths from the vaccine preventable diseases of diphtheria, tetanus, Pertussis, polio, measles, mumps, rubella, and congenital rubella syndrome have declined from 4,236 annually to 0 in vaccinated persons, ² and
16 17 18	WHEREAS, between 1950 and 2013 cases of these vaccine preventable diseases decreased from over $450,\!000$ annually to 807^2 , and
19 20	WHEREAS, the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has declared the current U.S. vaccine supply as the safest in history ³ , and
21 22 23	WHEREAS, wellness and the prevention of disease is an essential part of the care osteopathic family physicians provide to patients; now, therefore be it
24 25 26 27 28	RESOLVED, the American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) support the recommendations of The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP); and be it further
29 30 31	RESOLVED, the ACOFP supports the declaration of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention that vaccines are safe, and be it further
32 33	RESOLVED, the ACOFP support the education of the public, payors, and government entities about the safety and effectiveness of vaccines.
