RESOLUTION NO. 22

- WHEREAS, physicians must proactively address the sexual health and needs of their patients
 and allocate time during office to address sexually transmitted diseases, unintended
 pregnancies, and unhealthy sexual decisions, specifically among teens and young
 adults; and
- 5 WHEREAS, young people, between the ages of 15 to 24, account for 50% of all new STDs,
 6 although they represent just 25% of the sexually experienced population; and
- 7 WHEREAS, 1 in 4 teens contract a sexually transmitted disease every year; and
- 8 WHEREAS, only about 35 percent of primary care physicians report that they often or always
- 9 take a comprehensive sexual history and are often reluctant to address sexual health,
- 10 due to embarrassment, feeling ill-prepared, belief that sexual history is not relevant to
- 11 chief complaints, and time constraints; now, therefore be it
- RESOLVED, that the American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) shall provide
 members with access to educational materials on sexual health concerning teens and
 young adults.
