 6 nutritional education medical school, and only 25% of medical schools have a required
 7 nutrition course^{2,3}; and
- 8 WHEREAS, patients face challenges, including access to specialists such as nutritionists and
 9 registered dieticians in their communities, specifically in rural areas, or lack of insurance
 10 coverage to afford access to said specialists, leading patients to rely on their physicians to
 11 provide most of their nutritional information; and

- 13 WHEREAS; 51% of medical school graduates report the perception of inadequate nutritional
 education; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) encourage the
 incorporation of nutritional education as a core aspect of osteopathic medical education to

18 ensure physicians are competent in providing nutritional education to patients.
