RESOLUTION NO. 13

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- 1 WHEREAS, treatment of pain is a priority for the family physician; and
- 2 WHEREAS, physical pain can be treated appropriately in the outpatient setting; and
- 3 WHEREAS, physicians must not only treat our patients with due respect but must follow
- 4 recommended national guidelines; and
- 6 WHEREAS, many risks and benefits are associated with pain medications; and
- WHEREAS, hazards exist with high level and potent medications; and
- 8 WHEREAS, there continue to be overdoses and adverse events from potent pain medications; and
- 10 WHEREAS, American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) is a leader in our
- profession and continually advocates education and leadership; and
- 13 WHEREAS, medication interactions take additional training to prevent adverse outcomes; and
- 15 WHEREAS, so many alternatives exist osteopathically to treat pain; now, therefore be it
- 17 RESOLVED, that the American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) considers pain
- management and substance use disorder CME lectures that are based on needs assessment at our
- 19 Annual ACOFP convention and within other ACOFP programs, including legal aspects of treatment
- with updated guidelines and best practices.
